

SPARTA JOB FAIR

The Department of Workforce Development for the State of Wisconsin held a Veterans Job Fair on June 16, 2010 at the Army National Guard Armory in Sparta, Wisconsin. Of the displays set up, there were 21 employers (including one Federal Agency) and 19 benefit providers. The Job Fair ran from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. and had a very good turnout with 98 Veterans registering for the event.

Through the employers attending the event there were 130 current positions open. There were five veterans hired at the event, and there were 125 confirmed future interviews for the veterans. There was a van from the VAF that made the trip to Sparta taking 14 of our Veterans (including the driver) to take part in the Job Fair. Of these 14 individuals, there were five future interviews set up that day; there may be more interviews pending.

Vern Tranberg represented the Veterans Assistance Foundation (VAF) at the Job Fair as a benefit provider/outreach information table. He indicated that several of the veterans stopped at the VAF table to inquire about the program and to look at the pictures of the program facilities. He commented that they all said they were very happy someone was helping our fellow veterans. He handed out several brochures and asked them to spread the word about the program to any Veterans they knew who may need the services provided by the VAF.

Dawn Ollendick also attended the Job Fair in the afternoon. She and Vern both made contact with several of the employers present to either set up a possible working relationship with a new employer or to touch base and strengthen the relationship with a current employer working with the VAF.

The following organization/individuals are recognized for their special contributions to the Veterans residing in VAF-operated programs in Wisconsin:

FRIENDS OF VETERANS

Moss Dahn and Ronessa Revels have supported the Veterans Assistance Foundation (VAF) since its inception in 1994. Moss bought new televisions for the dayrooms to replace the old sets that were over 20 years old. They brought in towels, washcloths, sheets, clothing and other items that the VAF could use to help the Veterans in the program. When the VAF needed refrigerators for the program, Moss found a way to get them. Moss wasn't afraid to ask organizations for donations to help the Veterans.

In 2002 Moss and Ronessa decided they wanted to do something bigger to help raise money for VAF. So talk was started of a fundraiser, that turned to a Poker Run and finally to a Bike Blessing. The first Bike Blessing and Poker Run was held in May 2003 with approximately 20 bikes registered and they raised \$100 for the VAF. They decided to hold the event again the next year and had 10 to 12 friends and family members helping them organize the event, which has turned into an annual event and grown from there. This year they had approximately 100 people signed up some only came to have their bikes blessed, while others took part in the Bike Blessing and the Poker Run itself, which was 90 miles long for the whole route. This year, the Friends of Veterans Bike Blessing and Poker Run raised \$5,000 for the VAF.

In 2008, the Friends of Veterans lost Moss due to a motorcycle accident; at that

time, Ronessa was going to give up on the Friends of Veterans as it was something they had built up together. Several members of the group would not give up on Ronessa and told her that Moss would have wanted her (and them) to keep it going to help the Veterans. Ronessa decided to stay with the group and keep it going. The Friends of Veterans currently has over 40 members in the group with approximately 15 of them Veterans themselves with service dates ranging from WWII, Vietnam, Desert Storm, OEF/OIF, other conflicts, peacetime and currently serving on active duty.

The members of the Friends of Veterans put on an annual Thanksgiving Dinner for the residents of the Veterans Assistance Foundation. They cook a traditional dinner with turkey, potatoes and gravy, stuffing and pies, along with several other goodies. They come in and serve the dinner to the Veterans and thank them for their service to our country. Many heartfelt conversations take place between the two groups on this day.

The Friends of Veterans is not a Motorcycle Club, but a group of people who come together to help and support others — they are a "family". Even though there are Veterans in the group, several members are not Veterans, but have joined because they have family members that have served in the United States military. Ronessa always tells everyone, "The Friends of Veterans isn't about us, it's about helping others."

WDVA SUPERMARKET OF VETERANS BENEFITS CLEVELAND, WISCONSIN

On the 4th and 5th of June, VAF's Dawn Ollendick attended a Supermarket of Veterans Benefits in Cleveland, Wisconsin as an outreach effort for the Veterans Assistance Foundation.

At this free "one stop shop," veterans can learn about eligibility criteria for state benefits, programs for veterans and services available to them. They can also apply for their benefits. Veterans also receive information about loans, education and employment benefits.

Veterans who earned medals and need to get them or have them replaced had an opportunity to do that, as well. Veterans could apply to get their medical records or DD214'S ordered and obtain information about assisted living and nursing home care available to them. Veterans could also pre-register for burial in state veterans' cemeteries.

It was very busy both days and also very educational for Dawn. This event was well organized and she met a lot of nice people. These events are very important to our veterans; many of the veterans who came to this event were not aware of all their benefits.

OUTREACH TO SUPERMARKET

VAF's Faye Rainey was able to attend the Supermarket of Veterans Benefits on July 3rd of this year. It ran in conjunction with Operation Freedom hosted by Milwaukee County at the Milwaukee County Zoo.

Besides the Veterans Assistance Foundation, there were over 35 providers that gave information regarding VA health care, federal and state benefits and educational opportunities. Many were there for veterans and there were several others for all individuals – not just for veterans.

Hundreds of veterans from all service periods, including Iraq and Afghanistan, came through the display areas that day. It was nice to hear the many expressions of gratitude from people in their appreciation for us being there and providing the services that we do.

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
